

Valentine's Day Greetings and Gifts

Valentine's Day is celebrated in the United States, Canada, Mexico, the United Kingdom, France and Australia. In Great Britain, Valentine's Day began to be popularly celebrated around the 17th century.

By the middle of the 18th century, it was common for friends and lovers of all social classes to exchange small tokens of affection or handwritten notes, and by 1900 printed cards began to replace written letters due to improvements in printing technology. Ready-made cards were an easy way for people to express their emotions in a time when direct expression of one's feelings was discouraged. Cheaper postage rates also contributed to an increase in the popularity of sending Valentine's Day greetings.

Americans probably began exchanging hand-made valentines in the early 1700s. In the 1840s, Esther A. Howland began selling the first mass-produced valentines in America. Howland, known as the "Mother of the Valentine," made elaborate creations with real lace, ribbons and colourful pictures known as "scrap."

Today, according to Hallmark, an estimated <u>145 million Valentine's Day cards</u> are sent each year, making Valentine's Day the second largest card-sending holiday of the year after Christmas.

It has become a commercialised day in our society where red roses are a common gift with hearts and cupid being symbols of Valentines Day.





Rally Report

Club Coffee Run - Murchison to Goulburn Weir Wednesday 15th January 2025

Goulburn Weir provided a wonderful backdrop and shaded lawns for our picnic lunch. Always an amazing place... it is one of the very few things in our region still operating today that was built before motor vehicles existed.

This structure started no more than a handful of years after initial selection and settlement. With the river level elevated by 1890 water could flow out into the other marvels for their time; the East Goulburn Main Channel and the connection to Waranga Basin, and subsequently as far as Boort. And it all happened with gravity flow.

Initially built without a litre of petrol or diesel burnt and delivering millions of tons of water without fuel input. Our forebears who constructed it with their horses missed out on being awarded today's carbon credits. Perhaps their present-day successors should be mounting a class action for a retrospective payment!

Morningside Drive provided a road with perfect 'period ambience' for our 14 red plate vehicles and the four 'moderns' in attendance as we drove beside the rush of trucks and cars on the Hume Freeway.

Drivers' club has meant so much to Keith

Sometimes — if we are fortunate there is something in our lives, apart from our home and work, that comes important — an interest, a hobby, a passion, perhaps,

Over time, it can help carry us through good times, and bad.

For Keith Raverty, it is the Goulburn Valley Motor Vehicle Drivers Club — and this is how it came about.

In October 1970, Keith was look ing to buy a home for his wife and children.

He was interested in a house in Sutherland Ave.

On the property was the remains of a 1928 Buick, with a man — let's call him Tom — and some young fellows attempting to move what was left of the car

Watching them struggle, Keith asked if there was a club in town; the members might give him a hand.

Tom said there wasn't a club and Keith - also interested in vintage cars - said that he would put an ad in the newspaper asking for interest. In the next newspaper, Keith saw

an advertisement asking for interest in a club and inviting those interested to a meeting in Numurkah

Around 50 people attended the meeting, which was chaired by Tom.

It was decided that a club would be formed, the Goulburn Valley Motor Vehicle Collector's Club, and Tom became the first president. They all took a number, which

would remain with them throughout their membership. Laughing, Keith told me that he didn'trealise he'd be "stuck with the number for ever". Tom was number 1 and Keith was 39.

In the second year of the club's existence, Tom was no longer a part of it and Keith became president for the next three years - and for six of

the first 10 years. Keith started the first swap meet — which was, for many years, a sub-stantial fund raiser for the club; with hundreds of sites sold, originally at

the trotting track.

People came from all around Victoria.

Keith took care of this activity for

just on 20 years.

There were regular rallies and barbecues, and the club continued

to grow.
Meetings were relocated to Shepparton, where the majority of members lived.

Limited registration and name change

There were two similar clubs in Melbourne, which benefited from 'limited registration'. This meant that owners of vintage

cars weren't expected to pay the full registration fee — as most people rarely drove these cars on the road. Keith wanted the same benefit for Shepparton members

So, he began taking regular trips to our capital, to persuade the necessary people.

When he told me that he had taken 12 trips before succeeding, I

you?" I said. "They were sick of the sight of you." However, Keith had ensured that

the GV club was the first regional club to obtain this serious cost saving for members.

The state government provided registration books, in which details of activities were kept, and their registration costs were considerably reduced.

It also saved time and effort because previously, whenever a rally was held, each driver had to contact the Vintage Drivers Club to ask for permission to use the limited

Each participant had to include details of the rally's duration and length — then wait for a response.

The name of the club was changed to Goulburn Valley Motor Vehicle Drivers Club — because it more accurately reflected the membership.

About Keith

He was born in Melbourne and raised in Flemington; therefore, becoming a supporter of the North Melbourne Football Club.

He relocated his family to Shepparton in 1967, to take up the position of meat inspector at Stuart's Bacon Factory and the abattoirs.

He didn't purchase the house in Sutherland Ave because it had an outside toilet, which was too inconvenient with a son dependent on a wheelchair.

He found a more suitable home in Hawdon St, where he lived until purchasing 80 acres of orchard, with house, in Lemnos

He had been looking to purchase a home on a couple of acres
— because, at this point, he had 65 vintage cars (at various stages and in varied condition).

But he settled for the orchard,

compensated by the possibility of working it, in addition to his regular work, as a meat inspector. He says he didn't know an apricot

from an apple, but he successfully worked the orchard for four years, in addition to his regular job.

Then, there was yet another move, to Congupna; a brick veneer home on 150 acres; he retired from his job, relocated the 25 cars he still had and became a dairy farmer.

Muscular dystrophy finally took the life of his son, Steven, in 1982; he was 22 years of age. Three years later, his surviv-

ing son, lan, died in a motorcycle collision.

These were devastating times for Keith and his wife, Aileen.

However, his passion for the club, of which he was an inaugural member, remained.

He continued to attend meet-ings and events until 2019 when his health deteriorated. Aileen passed away in 2023.

Keith spent Christmas with his daughter Margo and her family.

I thoroughly enjoyed my time with Keith Raverty.
Although, like me, he is occasion-

ally searching for a date or a name, he remains sharp, interesting and good company. I thanked him for the fun we had

and left, very aware that, like many who have lost their lifelong partner he is lonely. I was now also aware of just how much this club had meant to him

and still does. In case you are interested, a three-bedroom brick veneer house with the five remaining acres at Congupna will be on sale shortly. My number is at the bottom of the

Getting to Know Me

When I mentioned to Heather at the last meeting that I liked her "Getting To Know Me" section was a great idea, as you found out about people before it was too late. She replied "Good, you're next'. So here we go. It's not easy putting one's life into a few paragraphs. I hope others follow.

I was born in Broken Hill and spent the first fifteen years of my life there. Being a bit of a loner and loved the freedom and the opportunity to roam the surrounding desert after school and at weekends. After completing primary school, I was sent to boarding school in Melbourne. The shock of Melbourne was quite dramatic, losing my freedom at Broken Hill, and put into an environment of strict draconian discipline, bullying, and extreme punishment for minor indiscretions. I hated the place and consequently my exam results were not good.

I began to study Mechanical Engineering at RMIT in 1964, and commenced work at G.M.H. Technical Section in January 1965 as a Technical Report Writer. Two years later I was made Assistant Road Test Engineer, then on to Prototype Vehicle Build-up Engineer - working on such vehicles as the first Bathurst Monaro's, the London to Sydney Race cars, the Hurricane Project, the prototypes of the HQ, and the introduction of the first Torana motor vehicles.

I left GMH in 1969 and joined a construction company, World Services and Construction, as a planning engineer at Altona, then the Shell Refinery at Geelong. Whilst at Geelong I was told I would be posted to Bougainville and was to attend an orientation day in Melbourne on 14th October 1970 with others going to Bougainville. On the way back to Geelong we called in to see some colleges working on the West Gate Bridge. We could not get down from the top quickly enough as we all realised something was very wrong with the bridge. It collapsed early the following morning, killing 35 workers. Returning from Bougainville I was posted to Gladstone in Qld. I resigned W.S. & C. in September 1972 and returned to Melbourne where I took up a position as Product Development Engineer with the Silentbloc Pty. Ltd. in Blackburn, close to our home in Doncaster East. This led to the positions of Manufacturing Engineer and finally to Technical Manager.

I desperately wanted to get out of Melbourne to have some space around me, so in 1976, I accepted a position as Production Engineer, with Flexible Drives Pty. Ltd. in Gisborne. In 1978 I was utterly sick of engineering and working for someone else and wanted to work for myself. With this in mind we purchased the Katunga General Store and Post Office and Mail Runs, planning to spend a few years there. After six months we realised that we would never leave the area as we became very involved with numerous clubs and organizations. It was one of our best decisions.

In 1995 we purchased a small orange orchard just up the road, sold the General Store in 1998, and moved to the orchard to retire. We sold the orchard in 2014 and moved to Numurkah in 2014 where we are still today.

I married my wife Lea, in December 1965, and we have three daughters (one deceased), five grand-children and at this stage no great-grandchildren on the horizon.

We have been members of the G.V.M.V.D.C. since 2015 and have enjoyed every minute of that time.



Death dealt a double blow

A TRUCK accident at Dookie last month claimed not only the life of a loved family man but a key worker in the successful SPC workforce agreement.

Mr Barry Collison, 42, died when the DECA truck in which he was a passenger overturned in the Nalinga Hills on June 16.

Mr Collison, was an electrician and union shop steward at SPC who found himself in the middle of the biggest industrial relations story in 1990.

As part of an historic agreement, Barry was privy to the early discussions and negotations and had to shoulder some of the burden when the company and workforce were criticised for their co-

operative deal.

Friends described him as a perfectionist, and his hobby of meticulously restoring old cars was proof of that.

His own restored vehicles included a 1925 Studebaker, a 1965 Red MGB and a 1930 Erskine Studebaker.

Barry would be known to many young couples because he and two other friends ran a wedding ear service.

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
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
